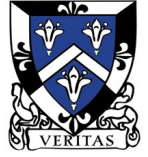

## Pastor's Corner

With the passing of Labor Day and the summer “officially” being over, it’s back to school time. Dreadful to say, I know, but let’s not think of school at its worst. School doesn’t necessarily mean buildings with that “schooly” smell, or classrooms, or writing utensils. In the Christian sense, all of us need schooling, all the time, all our life long: for we call Christ Lord and Master (rightly so), and “master” means teacher. He is the master, we the disciples—i.e., pupils. And the minute we cease to believe we have anything to learn, we cease being disciples and start being something else—but there’s nowhere else to go, since Jesus Christ and he alone has the words of Eternal Life. There is no such thing as “graduating” from the school of Christ.

But this doesn’t mean there is no progress. Progress for us in the school of faith is something different. It means growing in humility and docility, rather than in being puffed up with our knowledge. For the knowledge the faith gives us (and it is really is knowledge, the truest) teaches us the greatness of God and our radical dependence on him—for our mere existence, to say nothing of greater gifts—in our created state. The greater our knowledge God, the greater is to be our love of him and our gratitude to him for everything received—and the greater our love should be for everything and everyone that God loves. We should be increasingly grateful each day for the gift of faith itself, for not everyone has that gift.

“Back to school” time also means for our parish the resumption of CCD classes and the starting up of a new year of adult instruction in the faith, viz., RCIA (Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults). Please keep both the teachers and the learners in your prayers now and throughout the year—of course, we “teachers” are also called to learn constantly, and as with every other good thing, it is love of God that makes us more able to learn more and more about him. So, pray for us who are charged with teaching the gift of intense charity above all else—so that everything else (the ability to express things well, etc.) will come together. Please also—I have in mind here especially the 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. Mass-goers—think of taking part in (and adding to) the social life of the parish by dropping in now and then at coffee and

doughnuts and meeting the parents of CCD students and in general “being seen.” It’s something our parish and most Catholic parishes need. Let it not be said that our Protestant brothers and sisters have outdone us in friendliness and fellowship. Love of God and love of neighbor stand or fall together, and we all need to be supported in the faith and good works. Who knows what graces the Lord may shower on us by something as simple as our being convivial with each other? *Oremus pro invicem.* —Fr. Peter

## 2nd Collections this month

One week from now, we’ll be taking up a special collection for our foreign mission in East Africa (Kenya and Tanzania). Fr. Michael Dosch, pastor of Saint Patrick’s Church in Columbus, will be here as guest preacher that weekend.

Two weeks from now (Sep 20-21), at the request of Bishop Campbell, we will be taking up a special collection for the benefit of our Christian brothers and sisters undergoing persecution in the Middle East. Bishop Campbell actually asked us to take up this collection the weekend of Sep 13-14, but since the mission appeal was already in place, we will have to do it the following weekend.

Finally, the last weekend of the month (Sep 27-28) we will take up a special collection for Muskingum Valley Right to Life. I have tried to distribute various 2nd collections throughout the year in such a way that there are no more than two per month, or three in a row like this—but it isn’t always possible to keep to that ideal. Your generosity, as always, is badly needed and greatly appreciated.

**Mass intentions**—The parish Mass intention book for 2015 opened up this past Monday. Until the beginning of Advent, I ask that people request no more than ten Masses (per family); after then, there will be no limit on how many Masses one may request. My reason for the temporary limit on Masses is to offer a grace period for everyone who wants to have Masses offered for their loved ones a chance to claim some before all the dates are gone. I don’t blame people for wanting as many Masses as possible for their loved ones—far from it! But everyone should have a chance. (Know also that even once all *parish* Masses are spoken for, you can still request Masses that can be said at other times, and even by priests in other locations, e.g., our large community in Washington, DC, foreign mission priests, etc.)

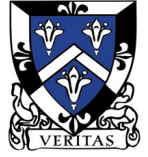

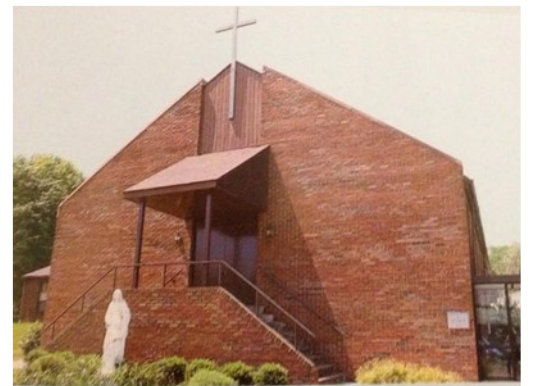


## A History of St. Thomas Aquinas Church Part XV – A New Beginning

According to Mr. Robert John Joseph Harkins, when the cemetery east of the city had been purchased, the remains in the church lot had been removed to that cemetery. Apparently much confusion arose upon the removal of those remains. Those who knew their own burial plots had no trouble, but there were many whose relatives had been buried there and they had lost all recollection of the locality of their lots, and “nothing could be done but to gather the bones and put them in boxes made for the purpose, and bury them in the cemetery, which was done”.



Given that the bodies of the deceased members of the parish had been removed from the grounds, there was no hesitation to move toward the construction of a new Church and so St. John Church was razed in the fall of 1841. Mr. Harkins recounts that, “...there is a small frame church in Taylorsville (Philo), called St. Ann’s...which has parts of St. John in its walls. The widow sash and the frames, the doors and door frames, were once part of St. John’s; the bell, too, is the one Fr. Stephen H. Montgomery got on one of his trips to Europe, and is now in use in the cupola of St. Ann’s”. When a new church was built in Philo, that bell was placed in front of the new brick structure. Sadly, St. Ann no longer exists. The structure was razed a few years ago, and we are uncertain of where that bell has gone. The bell that once called the faithful to Mass and tolled at their passing at both St. John and St. Ann, has disappeared into the mists of history.



With the generous donation of John C. Howard, the future looked bright for the Catholics of Zanesville. Early in 1842, the construction of the foundation of St. Thomas began. The cornerstone of Saint Thomas Aquinas Church was laid on March 17, 1842, and blessed by Bishop Richard Pius Miles, O.P., who had served here in Zanesville as pastor at St. John Church, returned for this monumental event although at this time, he was serving the Church as Bishop of Nashville, Tennessee.

An early newspaper account reports that the weather was very cold for the ceremony. Mr. and Mrs. Robert Harkins and Louis Henry Dugan resided at Duncan Falls and drove by way of the river in a sleigh drawn by two horses. The ground was covered by a deep fall of snow, which had set in sometime before and laid upon the ground for a long time. The first Mass was celebrated in the basement of the building on the following Christmas morning of 1842. A correspondent from the *Freeman’s Journal* and who was present for this occasion, writing on December 29, 1842 said that, “St. Thomas’s Church was finer than any temple of Catholic worship then in New York or Philadelphia” (*Freeman’s Journal*, January 21, 1843).

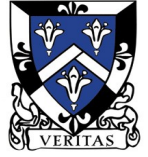


Fr. George A. J. Wilson was pastor of St. Thomas in 1842, but only for a brief span of time. In 1843, Father Wilson became Provincial, although he maintained his residence in Zanesville. Father C.P. Montgomery resumed the office of Pastor which he held until 1857.

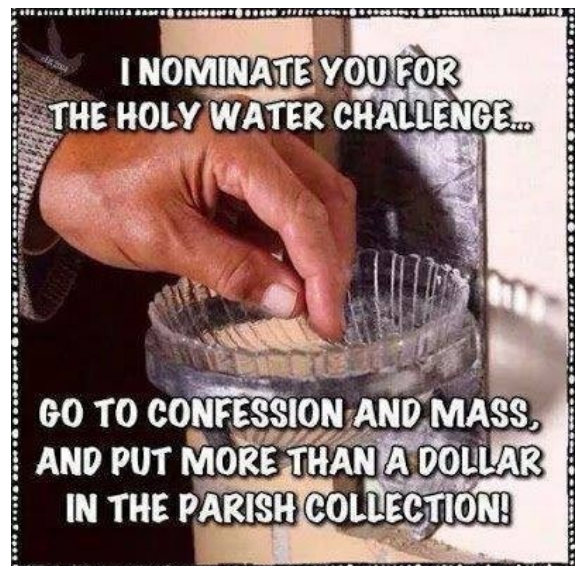

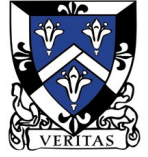
