PASTOR'S CORNER

This past week we had the feast of Sts. Thomas More and John Fisher, two of the first martyrs of the English Reformation. They died in witness to the Gospel, in particular that part of the Gospel that says that marriage is something designed by God himself—not invented by individuals or societies—that lasts until death. Marriage is in essence a bond, or a “tie” as some used to call it. But this bond is not a shackle or prison. It’s the kind of bond that unites and gives freedom. This part of the Gospel, like the whole Gospel, is “good news” not bad. The Church today speaks with the same clarity concerning the nobility and integrity of marriage as it did then, with the same clarity that the Lord spoke about it, for the Church is his: we are his body. Jesus’ statement that whoever divorces his wife and marries another commits adultery is often taken as a “hard saying,” i.e., as if marriage is a drudgery like a prison sentence. Well, that’s a pity. It wasn’t supposed to be a “shaming” but an exaltation of marriage as a great project that two people—a man and a woman—can set out upon, with God’s help, to have a life together and bring new lives into the world. And when John the Baptist reproved King Herod, and when Thomas More and John Fisher balked at Henry VIII’s pretended power to divorce and remarry—not to mention declare himself head of the Church in his realm—they were not just being difficult. They were giving witness to the beauty and integrity of truth, come what may. May the Church of Christ always give firm and loving witness to marriage as God intended it: loving, because enduring.

Some people have been concerned about the change at the 11:00 Mass: the **chalice** has not been offered to the people the last several weekends. The proximate reason is that there was an accident recently, where some of the precious Blood was spilled due to an accidental collision between. Now, that kind of thing is bound to happen now and then, but there have been three such incidents over the last few years, and remember, we’re not talking about ordinary liquid being spilled. It’s the Eucharist. And the thing is, the Communion stations we have in our church are awful. We have very narrow aisles and the horizontal break halfway up the church sometimes has people three-abreast at Communion time, and it’s hazardous—when I’m standing there ministering the chalice I often notice just how close the space is, and how the spillage of the Eucharist is just waiting to happen every Sunday. To people concerned, two things: First, I intend to create some space up toward the front of the Church where ministers of the cup can stand. I intend to have two cup stations on each side of church—to avoid the problem at the middle, the precious Blood will not be administered there (except to the infirm). This will of course require the removal of some pews from church, which I regret, but if you look, you’ll find that they’re packed in pretty tight with not a lot of room to spare at all. We really need

to open up some space, if it is the desire of the parish to continue having Communion under both species administered.

Secondly: it’s important for people to realize that by receiving under one species alone (usually the species of bread), one is not receiving any *less* of the Eucharist or of Christ. The glorified Christ, entirely present in any tiny smidgen of the host or any one drop from the chalice, cannot be divided (or multiplied). This is what is meant by Christ’s “substantial” presence in the Eucharist. What Christ is in heaven, he is that in the Eucharist, only without the revelation of his glory. So, those who receive a crumb and those who receive a huge quantity receive the same substance of Jesus Christ, no more, and no less (they will receive different calories, but that’s immaterial to the presence and power of Jesus in the sacrament). By the same token, those who receive just one species (say, of the bread) receive everything that someone receives who takes both species. Because what’s in both species is the body, blood, soul, and divinity of Jesus Christ. It is the ages-old traditional teaching of the Catholic Church that the faithful need not receive both species in order to receive the entirety of Christ. The contention that that the laity need to receive both species to obey the command of Jesus is both a heresy that found expression in both the ancient and late Medieval Church (“Utraquism”) and has been constantly condemned by the Church. It was dealt with thoroughly at the Council of Trent. If you want a good brief history of the idea and the Church’s teaching, you might try reading the excellent short article in the old Catholic Encyclopedia (accessible online through newadvent.org—just search “utraquism”).

It is true that there is a fuller sign-value to the Eucharist ministered and received under both species—the problem is, it becomes very difficult for large congregations to supply ministers enough (and in our case, *space enough*) to minister both species in a dignified manner, and without risk of spilling. If you truly love the Lord in the Eucharist, be grateful to Him for what he has given us. The word “Eucharist,” after all, means “thanksgiving.”
